We are so proud of our STUDENT or YOUTH members. In December, Angela (our music director) and her 10 students put on a concert playing the tunes that they had learned throughout the year as well as some Christmas tunes. The event was held in



Grace United Church in Coombs. The concert was attended by all the students' families, many of our club members and members of the church. By the start of the music there was only. The students' standing room performance was excellent and drew lots of applause from the audience. We even had several people singing along. After the concert, we had cake and goodies downstairs followed by everyone playing some of the Old Time Fiddlers tunes. It was a great ending to a marvelous evening and it really started to feel like Christmas. We have seen some of our student members mature over the last several years. We first highlighted them

in the spring of 2019 and are proud to have some of the first youth members still involved on a regular basis. Angela has been constantly coming up with ways to make the youth stay interested in learning and playing their fiddles. She has started up a youth group practice and they will be rehearsing twice a month. They are prepping for Canada's National Fiddling Day performance in May. They will be playing a selection of traditional tunes and a few original tunes written by Angela. They are calling the new effort Season One – Exciting things to come!!!

Not only does Angela teach young musicians but she has a couple of Old Time Fiddler members taking lessons. Our Vice President, Bob Berge has been taking lessons from Angela for about a year. See you can teach an old dog, an 86 year old dog, new tricks. Bob tells us he last took lessons in Portland, OR from Alex Cardston when he was just 21 years old. He mainly plays by ear but feels the new lessons help him with memory.

Bob has fond memories of playing his fiddle in many places. On a visit to Thailand, Bob and Chai-son (a new friend) played their fiddles on the famous bridge over the River Kwai. He also remembers busking in Bangkok with a youth group playing on hammered dulcimers and Bob on his fiddle. Bob did not make any money on that one, but what a wonderful experience.

When on a visit to Sweden and Norway, Bob was fortunate to spend several hours playing fiddle with a relative. His ancestors had immigrated to the USA from Tromso, Norway and he always wanted to visit there.

Bob once played his fiddle at the fall fair in Masset, BC. To support the 4-H Club he purchased three raffle tickets and won a stinky billy goat. Bob tried to give the goat back to the kid who had donated it but had to pay him an additional \$10 to take it back.

On a more recent camping/fishing trip, Bob & I (Tom) made a stop in Barkerville, BC. We spent an hour playing our fiddles on the porch of the barber shop. Bob had played there in the past when he lived in Quesnel and was really looking forward to being able to play there again. Speaking of barber shops, Bob also owned his own shop in Qualicum Beach and he tells us on a slow day he would play his fiddle between haircuts to entertain passersby. Bob has been dealing with a diagnosis of PLS for several years but he does not let that stop him. PLS stands for Primary Lateral Sclerosis which affects his mobility and he now has to get around with a walker. With the help of Bob's partner Darlene, he still manages to get to all the performances and practices with the

Old Time Fiddlers. Bob also leads off most of the tunes when performing at the senior residences. Even with Bob's disability, he spends a fair amount of time repairing fiddles and returning them or donating them to young fiddlers.

Bob has been a member of the Coombs Old Time Fiddlers for about 24 years and has great memories of all the wonderful people he and Darlene have met and become long time friends with. We wish him many more years to make even more memories.

Last but not least we would like to acknowledge our Snowbird members. We look forward to them coming back every year to help entertain the seniors. We wish they could remain year round. A big THANK YOU for the time you spend with the Coombs Old Time Fiddlers.

"I first attended the Old Time Fiddlers with a friend who was interested. After a few visits I was asked to join in a jam session. I sang a couple of songs with them. Soon after, I was paired up with a regular member who is proficient on the guitar. We practiced a couple of songs, and we performed at the Jamboree. It was a lot of fun and seemed to be well received. I look forward to joining in again soon."

So, with a lack of other submissions, I can only add to this by telling you about one of our oldest members, (in membership but not in age), wink. Ed Medford's story: "When I first met my wife, I went to her home outside of Wolfville Nova Scotia. Her father had taken his fiddle out, and her brother-in-law was playing guitar. I was instantly hooked. As a teenager I had always liked fiddle music, listening to The Farmer Jamboree, on the radio. But this was somehow different, this was "real". So, I took it on myself to learn to play some of that kind of music. It was a very long process, but twenty years later, being stationed at Comox on Vancouver Island, I was walking through the Comox Mall, and Branch #17 was holding a simulated fiddle contest. I started inquiring about how to go about joining, and the rest is history." We have been having a lot of rain this Fall and Winter,
